



The government has three tools available to fix systems like this:

- New IT systems we all know about this one the root cause of the 2019 problems
- Additional people they have done this, and so far, it hasn't improved the situation

- Better management they are making strides on this, improving their team structures so that every team has the equivalent of a registrar, and changing incentives to encourage people to progress cases to completion.

And what are we doing to apply pressure?




Prospects for 2024

When looking at the data it is important to note that not all applications result in a grant. This table shows that there is a natural attrition of about 4%. The shortfall is over and above that natural attrition.

Probate

Inquiry

The Probate Registry has been experiencing significant delays. There are wider concerns about how effectively beneficiaries, executors and the bereaved are supported through the process and protected from rogue traders. The inquiry will take evidence on capacity, resources and delays across the probate service, and the impact of digitisation and centralisation, including the effectiveness of the online probate portal. The inquiry is interested in people's experiences of applying for probate including how the administration of probate could be improved for people who are already coming to terms with the loss of a loved one.

Working with the Law Society

Blerta Clubb, ILM Director is also a member of the Law Society Wills and Equity Committee.

Obviously, they are also very concerned about the situation, and have recently produced a report: Online court services: delivering a more efficient digital justice system.

They have made several recommendations which will help government resolve the issues identified in our report. This research has also helped the Law Society produce some fresh ideas for practical, affordable changes to our civil justice system that will enhance access to justice in the long term and could save the system £72 million over a five-year period.
